


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NATIONAL RESULT MATRIX (NRM)

The national result matrix (NRM) is crucial in the country's development planning framework. This matrix is a strategic planning tool used to track, monitor, and evaluate progress toward achieving development goals and targets set by the government at the national level. NRM provides a structured framework for translating strategic development goals into actionable plans, monitoring progress, and ensuring accountability in pursuing sustainable development outcomes. It serves as an essential tool for guiding decision-making, resource allocation, and coordination efforts at the national level.

Ethiopia has been implementing the ten-year development plan (TYDP), outlining its development priorities and programs. The long-term TYDP is implemented through medium-term development planning frameworks by effectively formulating and implementing MDIP. NRM helps align these plans with specific objectives, targets, and indicators, ensuring that development efforts are focused and coordinated. Like many other countries, Ethiopia is committed to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Africa Agenda 2063. NRM provides a mechanism for tracking progress towards these goals at the national level, enabling the government to assess its performance and identify areas requiring attention. Hence, the basis of the NRM is the national overarching development vision and objectives that Ethiopia aims to achieve within the TYDP. It is also derived and aligned with the regional and global development frameworks of the Sustainable Development Goals and Africa Agenda 2063 or other pertinent national, regional, and global framework documents.

Policy Area, Strategic Goals, Core Strategic Activities, and KPIs: For each policy area, NRM specifies measurable key performance indicators (KPIs) that will be used to assess progress, categorised under strategic goals and core strategic functions across the different sectors. These indicators or KPIs are typically quantitative metrics that reflect the desired changes or outcomes associated with each strategic goal under those sectorally identified policy areas. Indicators are designed to be specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound (SMART). NRM set specific targets for each indicator, representing the desired level of achievement within the specified time frame. Targets help provide benchmarks for progress assessment and serve as motivators for policy action and development program interventions.

NRM Metadata: Within the MDIP context, the NRM includes baseline data (EFY 2022/23) to provide a starting point for monitoring progress. Baseline data establishes the initial values of the selected indicators, allowing for comparison over time to assess changes and trends. NRM outlines mechanisms for monitoring and evaluating progress towards the established targets, and it will be supported by national NRM metadata. The metadata encompasses a variety of data elements that provide context, clarity, and guidance for measuring KPIs towards achieving strategic policy results. The key components of NRM metadata are KPI definition, methodology or approach (i.e., how to collect, compile, and analyse data for each KPI), data quality principles and practices, and data reporting mechanisms and formats.

Responsibilities and Accountability of Government Organs: NRMs often assign responsibilities and roles to different stakeholders involved in implementing and monitoring the plan. This ensures clarity regarding who is accountable for specific actions and outcomes. The government is committed to strengthening accountability and transparency in its development processes. NRM establishes clear responsibilities and targets for respective sectoral line ministries and government organizations, fostering accountability and ensuring that resources are used efficiently and effectively. Efforts have been made to standardize and harmonize this NRM at the regional levels.

NRM, Resource Allocation, and Prioritisation: Ethiopia faces resource constraints, necessitating careful allocation and prioritization of resources. NRM provides the framework for setting targets under each policy area. At the same time, resource allocation and prioritisation ensure that resources are allocated effectively to support the implementation of development programs, projects, and activities (PPAs) in line with identified strategic goals and priorities. By aligning resource allocation with the strategic goals and expected results outlined in NRM and prioritising PPAs accordingly, the government is committed to enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of development efforts, ultimately contributing to achieving sustainable development outcomes set in TYDP and MDIP.
